### Being artisans of hope in our blessed and broken world

The call to care for our common home, which is replete with diverse beauty, holds unprecedented urgency. Driven by an ethic of caring about the future of our planet we along with so many others responding to this call seek creative and effective ways to heed this urgency. In his encyclical *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis urges us to listen to "the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor" (#49). It is always the poor who suffer most from the degradation of the earth.

# Referring to the Genesis text Pope Francis writes of *tilling and keeping the garden of the world*:

"Tilling" refers to cultivating, ploughing or working, while "keeping" means caring, protecting, overseeing and preserving. This implies a relationship of mutual responsibility between human beings and nature. Each community can take from the bounty of the earth whatever it needs for subsistence, but it also has the duty to protect the earth and to ensure its fruitfulness for coming generations.
