At the beginning of Lent, pray for the grace to listen deeply to the Word of God spoken in ourselves, in other people, in the world and in nature.

Listen to the word He will speak to you. God always speaks! He is the Word. To totally listen we must be silent, and silence is not easy, but: don't be afraid of silence, don't be afraid of listening to His words. His words are always LIFE, but they can be demanding. (Conference of Helen McLaughlin rscj 1985)

Jesus listens deeply...

Today's Gospel (Lc 4, 1-13) invites us to go out into the desert of silence, in order to listen.

From the Hebrew the word "desert" (midbar) can be translated as "the place from where someone speaks", "the place of conversation". An invitation to the desert is an invitation to enter a space where God can be heard.

Jesus is deeply sensitive to the Word of the Father. His trial in the desert can be seen as an intense experience of listening, as an effort to gain greater awareness of his life's mission.

A word... Every word... In the beginning there was the Word.

Now there is another beginning...

In the beginning of public activity there was a Word for Jesus. Jesus learned something important about listening and its close connection with prayer in the desert. He learned that prayer begins with listening.

"When you talk, you are only repeating what you already know. But if you listen, you may learn something new."

He listened and felt discouraged. He listened and was surprised.

Listening gave Him insight and self-discovery. Listening made Him grateful and made Him feel weary. Yet He always listened.

He listened to wheat fields and plain old fox holes. He listened to faithful friends like Martha and less faithful ones like Judas.

He listened to the unwanted and the loved.

He listened to human needs and the signs of the times.

He listened to Himself and the Father.

He listened...

Listening requires receiving the message and allowing it to affect our lives. Such deep listening does not allow for hardness of heart or human coldness. Deep listening leads to compassion and to transformation.


Deep listening means starting a journey beyond the ears to the heart, beyond hearing to understanding and feeling.
